

A family dinner was held in the home of Charles Cook, Sunday, to celebrate his 90th birthday. He was born Feb. 6, 1876 in a log house on what is now known as Marquette Rd. He attended the Persel School and climbed rail fences on his way to school.

On November 26, 1903 he married Elvia Dunsmore, who died Feb. 25, 1959. They had three children, Vera DeGraw, Pontiac, Clifford, Lambs Rd. and Frederick, Marysville. They lived in Richmond at one time and St. Clair, where he

In 1916 they bought the rambling old hotel, on the corner of Wales Center Rd. and Lambs Rd., known as the Grover House. This 16 room building had been built of logs originally and later a frame and siding had been built around the logs and a second story added. It burned the day before Thanksgiving 1929. They built a comfortable stone house on the site where the old hotel had stood and that is what Charley lives in today.

He was a Dairy Farmer from 1924 to 1955. In the early years the milk was separated from the cream and he took the cream to Goodells or Lambs to sell it. The skimmed milk was fed to the pigs.

Many changes and improvements took place during these years. He said that one of the best things to happen to the dairy farmer was when President Franklin D. Roosevelt authorized a milk bonus and raised the price of milk. This was soon after the depression and saved the farms for many farmers by enabling them to pay their mortgages.

Charley lives alone and does most of his own cooking. He is in excellent health, except he does not hear as well or see as well as he use to. Police Will Enforce Safety Program

LANSING - Machinery is being geared up this month by the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police for a new safety enforcement emphasis program designed to improve the driving behavior of motorists and to helpreverse Michigan's rising traffic toll.

Spokesmen for the chief's association have emphasized their concern over the state's worsening traffic accident situation. They point out that while motor vehicles increased 20 per cent and travel increased 27 per cent between 1961 and 1965, deaths have

gone up 36 per cent, casualties 66 per cent and total reported accidents 55 per cent.

Unless this trend is forced downward, the next few months threaten to make 1966 the worst in Michigan's history.

The chief's association adopted the enforcement plan at its recent annual meeting upon recommendation of its Safety and Traffic committee. Under the plan, all police departments (including the Michigan State Police and Sheriffs' Departments) which



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
